OVERVIEW OF RGNIYD

The Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD) is an Institution of National Importance by the Act of Parliament No. 35/12. It is an apex Institution of the Union Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, functions with the goal of building the capacity of youth organisations, functionaries and professionals. The Institute works in close association with NSS and NYKs in conducting training programmes across the country for youth functionaries. RGNIYD endeavours to facilitate the nation's youth with a conducive environment and tools that will enable them to make the most of their natural potential to realize their aspirations.

RGNIYD serves as a vital resource centre with its multi-faceted functions of conducting training programmes for youth functionaries across the country, besides offering academic programmes, engaging in seminal research in the vital areas of youth development and extension and outreach initiatives across the country.

RGNIYD serves as a youth observatory and depository in the country, thereby embarking on surveillance on youth-related issues. It has a wide network with various organisations working for the welfare and development of youth.

1.1. The objects of the Institute

- a. To evolve and achieve an integrated approach to youth development for preparing and empowering the youth for the future, by
 - i. providing action oriented research inputs for policy formulation;
 - ii. implementation of policy through extension and other programmes
 - promoting assessment and impact study and conducting teaching, training and other academic programmes;
- To set up advanced National Youth Resource Centre commensurate with the international standards to provide for comprehensive and scientifically analysed data on all

- youth-related issues and matters, with adequate library facility, documentation and publication;
- c. To provide for research and development and dissemination of knowledge through extension and outreach programmes;
- d. To act as a nodal agency for capacity building of stakeholders including youth bodies, organisations and agencies relating to youth;
- e. To empower youth to participate in inclusive development and nation building;
- To evolve as an institute of advanced study in the field of youth and to develop such professional excellence as may be required for the purpose;
- g. To provide for higher education in the field of youth development through employment-oriented and inter-disciplinary courses at the post graduate level.

1.2. Functions of the Institute

The Institute shall:

- develop as a "think tank" by way of carrying out policy research, evaluation and impact analysis on youth programmes and issues of contemporary and future relevance;
- b. function as a repository of knowledge pertaining to data on youth;
- develop documentation, information and publication of services for youth training and extension;
- d. provide technical advice and consultancy for formulation of youth related policy and promotion of youth programme;
- e. build the professional capacity of youth organisations, both in Government and voluntary sector;

- f. design, develop and conduct appropriate training and orientation programmes;
- g. conduct seminars, workshops and conferences on issues relating to youth;
- h. set up centres for dissemination of academic and training programmes;
- collaborate with national and international university, centres, institutes and such other agencies relating to youth training and youth development;
- j. establish programmes of study and research and to provide for instruction in such branches of study as the institute deems appropriate;
- k. award, subject to such conditions as the Institute may determine, degrees, diplomas, certificates or other academic distinctions or titles at various academic levels:
- confer honorary degrees or other distinction awards, fellowships, scholarships, prizes and medals;
- m. determine, demand and receive fees and other charges for its courses, programmes and other matters;
- conduct and coordinate projects and studies relating to youth sponsored by the Government of India and other developmental agencies;
- create with the prior approval of the Central Government, academic, technical, administrative, managerial and other posts in the Institute and make appointments thereto in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Institute
- p. regulate the conduct of the affairs of the Institute

- q. supervise and control the discipline of all categories of employees and students of the Institute;
- purchase, hire, lease, exchange or acquire property, movable or immovable and to construct, alter and maintain any building or buildings as may be necessary;
- s. set up distance learning or educational centres, in collaboration with Open Universities, to provide access to the aspiring young professionals enabling them to take up a career in the field of youth development;
- t. establish, maintain and manage halls of residences and hostels for students;
- lay down conditions of service including a code of conduct for teachers and other categories of employees;
- v. supervise, control and regulate the discipline of students of the Institute and to make arrangements for promoting their health and general welfare
- w. coordinate student exchange programmes with reputed International Youth Development Institutions
- x. undertake, assist and promote all such activities conducive or incidental to the attainment of the objectives.

1.3. Governance Structure of RGNIYD


Hon'ble President of India is the Visitor of the Institute.

Youth Development

M.Sc. Counselling Psychology

The PG Programme in Counselling Psychology offered by RGNIYD has strong roots in theory and contemporary practice commensurate to the profession. The programme enables the students to diagnose the problems of the clients scientifically and employ the therapeutic techniques and counselling skills during the counselling process together with ethical considerations. This cutting edge programme allows the students to choose their areas of specialization with inbuilt theory-practice nexus. The students are provided with opportunities for field practicum, internships, case works, institutional visits and supervised skill training in each domain of specialization in counselling viz., school, adolescent, career, family and work place.

The students could secure lucrative employment openings in educational institutions, corporates/industries, hospitals, adolescent and adult rehabilitation centres, NGOs, family and child care centres, legal sectors besides embarking on private practice, and as consultants to various organisations besides careers in teaching and research.

M.A. Development Policy and Practice

M.A. Development Policy and Practice is being offered in recognition of the need for the quality professionals in the development sector. The course is designed to break new ground, drawing extensively from the wide range of theoretical perspective, issues and practices with alternative possibility. The overarching framework of the programme encompasses the canvass of keu approaches, methodologies and methods. The pedagogic methods in the class room learning are entwined with the field immersion that provides immense opportunity for field tested learning. On the completion of the course, the students will be imbibed with substantive knowledge in development perspectives, issues and methodologies. This programme, with its value added thematic workshops and specialized training enhances the employability of the students as professionals in the development sector in diverse settings.

M.A. Gender Studies

The Master's Degree Programme in Gender Studies aims to fulfil the professional requirements of gender specialists in the development sector with a multi centric and development approach with diverse specialisations. The course is judicially balanced with strong theoretical foundations drawn from feministic scholarship, conceptual framework of gender issues built upon empirical knowledge and skill based courses with hands-on experience. The students of Gender Studies shall embark on an intellectual odyssey, a journey of two years, during

which they will be ingrained with theoretical and methodological perspectives in the first semester, exposed to the conceptual issues in the second semester, imbibed with analytical and application orientation in the third semester, and capacity building with requisite skills for developing and implementing women development programmes/ projects in the fourth Semester. The unique feature of the programme lies in the introduction of application and skill based papers such as Gender Budgeting and Auditing, Gender Analysis & Mainstreaming, Gender Planning and Development, and Gender Training. The inbuilt training component in the curriculum and value added thematic workshops conducted will enable the learners to become trainers in gender sensitisation and specialists in Gender Planning and Development.

M.A. Local Governance and Development

This programme structures multi-dimensional and inter-sectoral knowledge-base for strengthening Local Government Institutions and development organisations. The curriculum enables the youth to analyse the dynamics of decentralized governance and to equip them with the requisite skills towards realising local economic development and social justice. The new trends in the field like E-Governance, Common Property Resource Management, Public Policy, Sustainable Cities, Disaster & Risk Management, Evaluation of Programmes & Projects, Constituency Management, etc. are also incorporated in the programme. It empowers the learner to apply the principles of 'Horizontal Learning' to identify, share and adapt the best practices, to achieve 'good governance at the grassroots'. Thematic workshops, learning journey, internships, field-based studies, social laboratory, experiential learning, etc. add value to the programme and enhance the employability of the learners in diverse work settings.

M.A. Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship

The purpose of postgraduate degree in Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship is to provide students with a new orientation and way of thinking to organise and lead sustainable development through social entrepreneurship. It is a distinctive programme, structured to prepare the students professionally for meaningful social engagement by reflecting on the

issues of unemployment by setting new patterns and possibilities for employment generation through social innovation and entrepreneurship. The programme provides extensive use of case studies, field immersion oriented learning, enabling students to explore new analytical frameworks and the latest research within a context of social entrepreneurship. Students will build skills through group interaction in case discussions, simulations and team exercises and have opportunities to apply what they learn from class room to real world social business challenges.

In addition, the Institute launched the B. Voc. programmes in Fashion Design & Retail, and Apparel Manufacturing and Entrepreneurship in collaboration with the ATDC, Ministry of Textiles, Govt. of India.

M.A. Social Work (Youth and Community Development)

The Institute launched the M.A. Social Work Programme with specialization in Youth and Community Development during the year 2016.

Introduction of M.A. in Social Work with Youth Work and Community Development as a specialization would create a platform for delivering youth services in a professional manner by stimulating synthesis of theory and practice. The course aims to professionalize youth work and train youth workers as critical reflective practitioners.

Social work is an interdisciplinary subject which also needs to be expanded in the terrain of youth and community development. India is the youngest country with 64 per cent of its population in the working age group. The median individual in India will be 28 years in 2020 and the youth are going to be turned into a demographic dividend, it is essential to pay due attention to this dynamic workforce. Access to opportunities and providing training will empower the youth to contribute towards nation building. The National Youth Policy, 2014 (NYP-2014) also emphasizes on youth development and productive youth participation. According to a UN High Level Panel report on the Post 2015 development agenda and the Sustainable

Development Goals, Youth should be placed at the centre of any new development framework by focussing on youth development. This will enable them to design, implement and monitor youth empowerment strategies. For assessing the needs of the young people and to work for youth and community development, professional intervention calls for attention.

Social work is a professional and academic discipline which intends to enhance the quality of individuals, groups and communities belonging to weaker sections. Youth work is for all young people to build their capacity individually and collectively, to exercise citizenship and civic engagement and to create a democratic and just society. M.A. Social Work in youth and community development is a two years postgraduate course that aims to provide knowledge of youth work – origins, concepts, models, principles and practices with experiential learning. The course provides a comprehensive understanding of issues concerning youth and a professional approach to dealing with youth related problems.

At the end of the course, students of M.A. Social work in youth and community development will benefit as follows:

- Develop the ability to understand self, others and the society.
- Will be equipped with conceptual understanding of youth issues, set of transferable skills, positive attitude to work for youth in wide range or areas like institutional, educational, training and non-formal settings.
- Capacitated to deal with various problems professionally by using scientific methods and approaches.
- Become empowered citizens to exercise citizenship and civic engagement.
- Serve as social facilitators in bringing transformation in the lives of youth and communities through research, policy, direct practice (youth organizing and community development) and teaching.
- Become a professional youth worker in designing, organizing and delivering services for bringing changes in the lives of

young people, especially the socially and economically disadvantaged categories.

B.Voc. Programmes in Fashion Design & Design and Apparel Manufacturing and Entrepreneurship

Indian Textile and Apparel Industry has been growing significantly over the last many years and contributing to significantly to India's GDP and serves as the second largest employment providing sector next to agriculture. In the current scenario, the Apparel & Textile Sector plays a key role in the country's growth and economic development. The categories of jobs available in this sector are based on creativity, technology and management. The workforce required for Apparel Sector requires key competencies/ capabilities which facilitate not only innovative responses to market pressures, but also flexible adaptation to unstable and rapidly changing markets. With this backdrop, RGNIYD has introduced the Bachelor's Degree Programmes – B.Voc. in Fashion Design and Retail and Apparel Manufacturing and Entrepreneurship. These programmes are offered through a tripartite agreement among RGNIYD, Apparel Training and Design Centre (ATDC) and Institute of Apparel Management (IAM).

The Objectives of the course are:

- to provide vocational education, hands on training, enhance their employability skills and knowledge for performing various tasks and "employability roles" within the industry and to be highly valued by employers overseas.
- to make the learners as adaptive skilled workforce in accordance with technological advancement for creating future professionals

Post Graduate Diploma in Youth Development

In order to achieve the mandate of RGNIYD and execute the priority areas of National Youth Policy 2014, RGNIYD has launched the Post-Graduate Diploma in Youth Development (PGDYD) as one of its programmes of study from January, 2016 onwards.

The prime objective of this programme of study is to train professionals in the area of youth development across the nation with scientific knowledge and specific models of youth work. This programme will also target the workforce already working in the area of youth development in equipping knowledge and skills to work with youth more scientifically.

The programme is on offer through 'Convergence Mode' in collaboration educational institutions in India across 12 locations. The learners will be facilitated with Self-Instructional Material (SIM), and field activity manual. The learners will be supervised for their field work by the qualified supervisors and counselling sessions will be conducted by the qualified educators in the area.

Doctoral Programmes

The Institute continued to offer Ph.D. programmes (Full time and Part Time) which were launched during 2011. Presently, 23 full time scholars and

10 part-time scholars have been enrolled for Ph.D. programme in the Institute.

Statutory Academic Bodies

Departmental Boards have been duly constituted as pertheAcademicOrdinances. Consultation workshop on curriculum development was also organised. The 10th and 11th Academic Council were held on 18.09.2017 and 16.03.2018 respectively at Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD), Sriperumbudur, Tamil Nadu.

Academic Activities

During the year 2017-18, a total of 98 students were admitted to various post graduate programmes being offered by the Institute. A total of 269 students were admitted to B. Voc Programmes during the year 2017-18 through 19 ATD Centres across the country. A total of 52 candidates were enrolled under the Post Graduate Diploma in Youth Development during the period under report.

TRAINING AND OTHER ACTIVITIES OF RGNIYD AND RC, CHANDIGARH

4.1 Training of Trainers Programme:

ToT on Environment and Sustainable Development 04 – 08 April 2017; Aizawl, Mizoram

The Department of Development Studies conducted a ToT on Environment and Sustainable Development for NSS Programme Officers in collaboration with the Department of Social Work, Mizoram University, Aizawl, Mizoram during 4 – 8 April 2017. NSS Programme Officers of Mizoram University, ICFAI (Recognised by Mizoram Government), NIT, College of Veterinary Sciences & Animal Husbandry, Central Agricultural University participated in the programme. The total number of participants were 26 (19 male and 7 female).

ToT on Monitoring and Evaluation of Training Programmes 22-26 May 2017; RGNIYD RC, Chandigarh.

RGNIYD, Regional Centre, Chandigarh organized a ToT on 'Monitoring and Evaluation of Training Programmers' during 22-26 May 2017 in Chandigarh. Sri. G. Saravana, Regional Director, National Productivity Council under the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India, inaugurated the Programme. Sri. B. Purushartha, IAS., Commissioner, Municipal Corporation, Chandigarh, delivered the valedictory address. A total of 39 participants from different fields attended the programme.

ToT on Policies and Programme on Education for Youth

25 - 27 July 2017; RGNIYD, Sriperumbudur.

Centre for Training, Orientation and Capacity Building organised a 3-Day Training of Trainers Programme on Policies and Programmes of Education for Youth during 25-27 July 2017. The objective of this programme were to build the capacity of youth functionaries across the country to promote awareness on educational policies and

programmes available for youth and facilitate the learning needs of the marginalized young people through equitable access and to promote skill development through life-long learning among the youth. About 25 District Youth Coordinators of Nehru Yuva Kendra Sangathan (NYKS) from the states of Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha and West Bengal participated in this programme



ToT on Effective Facilitation Skills 04-08 August 2017; RGNIYD RC, Chandigarh.

A ToT on Effective Facilitation Skills was organized at RGNIYD RC during 4-8 August, 2017. The lead facilitators of the training were Mr. Ajat Shatru and Ms. Shubhi Mehta. Various aspects like Coaching, Designing and Planning Training, Listening, Questioning Skills, Communication were covered under the workshop. Around 30 participants from various states like Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, West Bengal and Delhi participated in the programme.

ToT on Life Skills Education 29 - 30 August 2017; Chennai, Tamil Nadu

RGNIYD in collaboration with the NSS wing of Sri Ramachandra Medical College and Research Institute, Chennai organised two-day Training of

Trainers on Life Skills Education. Thirty one NSS Programme Officers of the Plus Two Councils took part in the programme.

Delivering the inaugural address, Prof (Dr.) M. M. Goel, Director underpinned the need for understanding, analysing and interpreting the problems of adolescents and train them with life skills for inclusiveness to survive, exist and excel in times to come. Dr. PV Vijayaraghavan, The training covered topics such as 10 Core Life skills. During the programme, 31 NSS Programme Officers that include 21 male and 10 female from Chennai, Kancheepuram and Thiruvallur Districts participated.

ToT on National School Safety Programme 11-13 September 2017; RGNIYD RC, Chandigarh.

Separate Audit Report

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperumbudur for the year ended 31st March 2018.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperumbudur as at 31st March 2018, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 28(2) of the Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development Act, 2012. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management.

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. However, we are not able to form an opinion on the accounts of the Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperumbudur for the year 2017-18 in view of the following:

- 1. Advances given to various programmes and to staff amounting to Rs.2.12 crore were incorrectly accounted as expenditure in the year of payment in earlier years and these advances are yet to be settled. Though this was commented in previous SAR, no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.
- 2. Discrepancies / Non-reconciliation of Bank Accounts and Cash in Hand:
- a) The closing bank balance in SB account (Canara Bank A/c No. 2926101003230) as per books of accounts was ₹48,45,412 and balance as per bank statement was ₹97,234. The Institute has not furnished any reconciliation statement for the difference of ₹47,48,178. This was commented in previous SAR but no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.
- i) In the bank reconciliation statements furnished for CPF bank account (SB A/c No.88444070) and for March 2018, Cheques/DDs amounting to ₹18,80,443 deposited in bank from 2010 to 2015 were yet to be credited in bank account.

Cheques issued before 2008 amounting to ₹13,58,425 were not claimed for payment. Despite this being commented in previous SAR but no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.

ii) Similarly, in the bank reconciliation statement furnished for Institute main account (SB A/c No. 2926101000001) for March 2018, Cheques/DDs amounting to ₹13,29,824 deposited in bank during 2016-17 were yet to be credited in bank account. Cheques issued during 2015-16 & 2016-17 amounting to ₹2,58,506 were not claimed for payment. Cash remittance amounting to ₹8,21,071 during 2016 was not yet credited in

bank account. Despite this being commented in previous SAR, no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.

3. Fixed deposit balances as per books of accounts not matching with Fixed Deposit Receipts furnished to Audit.

The difference in fixed deposits disclosed in Balance Sheet and actual deposits held in banks was pointed out in previous SAR. However, no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.

- 4. Suspense accounts in Annual Accounts.
- a) Main Accounts -Balance Sheet Current Assets, Loans & Advances (Sch.7)

The following items were included under Suspense Heads in Schedule 7 of the Main Accounts Balance Sheet: i) Bank Deposit Suspense – ₹21,42,146; ii). Cash Deposit Suspense – ₹29,331; iii). Indian Bank Suspense – ₹3,86,798.

b) CPF Accounts - Balance Sheet

Based on the Audit Observation, separate accounts were prepared for CPF accounts. However, the following items were disclosed in the Balance Sheet: i) Difference between Current Assets and Current Liabilities – ₹37,84,347 ii) Difference in Opening Balance – ₹5,01,274 iii) Indian Bank Suspense – ₹5,22,198 iv) Withdrawal – ₹6,50,000 Similarly an amount of ₹34,83,462 was disclosed as Reconciliation Suspense in the Balance Sheet of NPS Accounts.

5. Unreconciled amounts in Accounts:

- a) The Closing balance was ₹92,03,11,269 in 'Capital Fund Account' in 2016-17 accounts and Opening balance in 2017-18 Accounts was ₹66,84,48,069.
- b) The total Assets/Liabilities as per annual accounts of 2016-17 was ₹95,59,70,184. However, in 2017-18 accounts, the total Assets/Liabilities in previous year column was shown as ₹93,58,93,237.

c) Though separate annual accounts were furnished for CPF transactions, CPF Deposit and CPF bank balance were appearing in two places, i.e. in RGNIYD main accounts and in CPF

accounts with different amounts.

d) Details of employees from whom the amount is recovered and accumulated were not

furnished in respect of Current Liabilities of ₹42,08,678 disclosed in the Balance Sheet of NPS

Accounts.

6. Student dues amounting to ₹6,79,070, prepaid expenses, refund receivable, etc.,

amounting to ₹49,99,128 have been disclosed under 'Current Assets & Loans & Advances' for

more than three years without any adjustment and confirmation for realising the same. Similarly,

security charges payable, salary payable, etc., amounting to ₹82,59,112 has been shown under

'Current Liabilities and Provisions' for more than three years. Though this was commented in

previous SAR, no corrective action has been taken by the Institute.

Schedule 14 - Significant Accounting Policies

1. Basis of preparation of financial statements

The Financial statements are prepared in the Uniform Format of Accounts prescribed by the Government of India for Central Autonomous Bodies in accordance with "Generally Accepted Accounting Principles" followed in India under the historical cost convention on mercantile basis.

2. Government Grants

Institute has both restricted and unrestricted grants. Restricted grants are funds (Earmarked Funds) which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions given at the time of grant

Grant received towards General Plan and Non-Plan and Grants received for specific programmes have been routed through the Income & Expenditure Account.

Capital Grants received have been accounted for under the Capital Fund in the Balance Sheet and unspent balances been carried forward. Pending recast of Capital Fund for addition and disbursal of funds received for creation of capital assets in previous years to current liabilities, Capital Fund is depicted in the Balance Sheet following the doctrine of consistency.

Recognition of Income and Expenditure

All known Incomes and Expenses are recognized based on accrual method other than Academic Receipts which are accounted for on cash basis.

4. Fixed Assets & Depreciation

Value of Fixed assets is exhibited at cost of acquisition less depreciation. Depreciation has been provided on the Written down value method as per the rates prescribed in the Income Tax Act, 1961. The rates of depreciation are consistently followed. Cost of acquisition is inclusive of inward freight, duties and incidental and direct expenses related to the acquisition.

For fixed assets belonging to Commonwealth Programme-Asia centre in Chandigarh, the market value as provided has been taken as grant-in-aid and added with the fixed assets, whereas depreciation has not been provided for such fixed assets.

As the institution continue to follow the written down value method, Gross Block of Assets are not shown in the relevant schedule.

5. Retirement Benefits

Necessary provision has been made for payment of gratuity to retiring employees. The provision for gratuity has been made on actual basis pending recognition under actuarial basis. As the institution is following New Pension System, no provision for pension has been made in the accounts.

2. PROGRAMME ADVANCE

The institute's policy is to provide advance to programme of organizers (both employees & outside institutions) for conducting various programmes. After completion of programmes, the institute receives expenditure Account from the programme organisers and settled. As there are differences between the figures in main accounts and subsidiary registers of pending advances, the same are being reconciled. Till such time reconciliation is completed, no change/adjustment has been made in the opening and closing balance figures of advance depicted in the balance sheets of the previous years.

3. Taxation

Since the institute has been registered u/s 12AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961; the computation of income has been prepared based on the actual Receipts & Payments Account (on Receipt Basis) as prescribed u/s 11 of the Income Tax Act, 1961. There will be no tax liability and hence no provision has been made towards taxation.

4. Provision for encashment of Earned Leave

A sum of Rs.10,097,139 (including previous years) has been provided in the annual accounts towards provision for encashment earned leave including prior years.

5. National Pension System

The institution is following New Pension System since 01.01.2004. The accounts for National Pension System (NPS) are maintained separately and separate financial statements were prepared therefor.

6. Contributory Provident Fund

For the employees covered under Contributory Provident Fund scheme, CPF accounts are maintained separately. The Fund Account is under reconciliation. Pending completion of reconciliation, some of the figures relating to CPF continued to be shown in the Annual Accounts of 2017-18 on consistency principle.

7. Contingent Liabilities

The institution was in receipt of Notice from Income tax Department regarding mismatch between collection and remittance of TDS and consequent arrears of Rs. 24,60,120 from 2008-09 to 2017-18 (10 years) for which the reconciliation is being done by engaging professional services.

8. Court Cases

There are two court cases pending as on 31.03.2018 before the Courts relating to administrative issues.

9. Student Mess Accounts

The institution is having separate hostels for boys and girls. Student Mess is managed by Student Mess Management Committee (SMMC) to which the mess fee collected from the students are periodically transferred. RGNIYD was marinating the account as Custodian. The accounts are being reconciled from previous years.

Bank Accounts

In the case of Bank accounts certain unreconciled debits/credits were pending since past years. Till such time the final reconciliation of these amounts by way adjustment/reversal is done, the same were temporarily booked under Reconciliation Suspense Account in the Balance Sheet. Confirmation of balances has been obtained from the concerned banks for running accounts and Fixed Deposits.

11. General

Previous year's figures have been regrouped / reclassified wherever necessary to conform to current

vear's Classification.

12. Internal Audit

The internal audit for the year 2017-18 was conducted by M/s B.Thiagarajan & Co., Chartered Accountants, Chennai.

13. Internal control system

The institution is in the processes of establishing a more secured internal control mechanism.

14. Physical verification of Fixed Assets and Inventory

Independent internal committees have been constituted to physically verify the fixed assets and inventory and the process is on.

15. Refund of Student Deposits

Since cash basis system of accounts is being followed for receipt of academic fees, any refund made out of that is done based on collateral evidence basis.

16. Academic Fees

Based on available information Academic fees is accounted have been grouped into two components viz. Academic fees and B.Voc fees including previous year.

17. Endowment Fund Investments

In the case of Lakshmi Vaidthyanathan Gold Medal Fund (2009) depicted in Schedule 3 – Earmarked/Endowment Funds, the Bank deposit (Rs.59927) in Canara Bank is held Jointly in the name of RGNIYD & Donors.

18. Earmarked/Endowment Funds- British Council
