#### **Preamble**

Youth development is a continuous process wherein, nations engrossed several policies and programmes to foster the fundamental needs of growth and development thatwouldenabletheyouthtoattainholisticalldevelopmentviz., biological, social, psychological, moral, educational, and career aspects which will empower the youth not only to function effectively in daily lives but also contribute to the nation building. When such positive youth developmental activities are not formulated and the youth are not channeled in proper direction, the youth often will be influenced to engage in unproductive and negative acts.

Further, both theory and practice has established adequate evidence that the early childhood experiences and the conducive stimulating environment created for an individual will result in an enriched personality development through the adolescence and adulthood stages and to unleash their full potentials. Creating such conducive conditions is a shared responsibility of the family, educational institutions, community in which they live and their society at large. There have been several advantages of promoting positive youth development including contribution to nation building by youth thereby lowering the jeopardies of high-risk behaviours.

Our country has been endeavouring to empower the youth in all spheres and to resolve youth related problems through appropriate interventions as enshrined in the NationalYouth Policy relating to each priority area and various schemes, policies and programmes of line ministries cutting across the subject of youth development.

Recognizing the paramount significance of youth development, The Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD), Sriperumbudur, Tamil Nadu designed and offered an exclusive program for the NCC Officers of the North Eastern Region to orient them on various dimensions of youth development and to equip them to train and lead the youth with whom they work very closely and to effectively shape them as responsible citizens. The program was conducted during Oct.27-31, 2020. The program was an earnest attempt to provide useful inputs on different facets of imperative issues and challenges the youth of our country face today, particularly in the phase of COVID-19 pandemic and equip the NCC Officers with requisite skills and capacities to deal with such concerns with their youth clientele.

#### **Objectives of the Program**

The objectives of the program were:

- 1. The youth of North East Region have immense potential but lack employability and entrepreneurial skill required to sustain oneself in the global competitive world. The programme shall try to familiarise them with different such skills that more employable in any sector.
- 2. The programme seeks to attract the youths to take up more entrepreneurial ventures so that they no longer remain job seekers but job providers. It is hoped that they contribute to make in India project of Government of India.

3. The Programme not only seeks to develop their personality and inter personal relations but also will try to hone their leadership skills and managerial skills so that they contribute in the process of nation building.

#### **Target Group for the Program**

The programme was exclusively conducted for the youths particularly Graduate and Postgraduate students of North Eastern Region. Over 250 students registered for the program. However, about 70 Students could be allowed to attend the entire program as per Covid-19 protocol.

#### **Inaugural Function of the Program**

The youth conclave on skill development programme for the young students of North Eastern Region was inaugurated by Prof. Sibnath Deb, Director, RGNIYD, Government of India who also delivered the Inaugural Address during the inaugural session.



The Vice Chancellor of Bhattadev University, Bajali, Prof. Birinchi Kr Das chaired the Inaugural session and addressed the participants speaking on the intent of the program keeping in view the concerns of young students need to address and how they can acquire skills through this program.

#### **Proceedings of the Activity**

# **RGNIYD Youth Conclave Programme organized by Bhattadev University**Dated 17 Dec to 19 Dec, 2020

The Conclave was organised by Bhattadev University in collaboration with RGNIYD, Govt. of India. The Three day Youth Conclave on skill development was hosted by Dr. Jitumani Rajbongshi, Activity Coordinator, RGNIYD Youth Conclave, 2020. On the very first day, the conclave was inaugurated by Prof. Sibnath Deb, Director, RGNIYD, Govt. of India. The Inaugural session was chaired by Prof. Birinchi Kr Das, Honourable, Vice Chancellor, Bhattadev University, Bajali.

The welcome address was delivered by Dr. Sajal Kr. Das, Academic Registrar and HoD, dept of Mathematics, Bhattadev University, Bajali.

Dr. Jitumani Rajbongshi, co-ordinator of the Conclave explained the objectives as:

- To develop the skill and personalities of the young generation required to effectively transition from the studying environment into workplace.
- To input leadership skills and managerial skills so that they can contribute in the process of Nation building.
- To create entrepreneurial mind set among the youths.

**Day 1:** Inauguration Ceremony ended successfully with the insightful remarks by Prof. Birinchi Kr. Das, Vice Chancellor, Bhattadev University, Bajali.

Following a tea break, the activity session started from 11.45 AM onwards on the topic of "Emerging Entrepreneurship Landscape: Challenges and Opportunities for Entrepreneurs from NE". The resource person was – Dr Sriparna B Baruah, SR Faculty & Head, Centre for Industrial Extension and Consultancy, IIE, GHY. The session ended on 12.45 PM.

Then from 12:45 PM to 1:45 PM the next session ran, covering the topic of 'Need of skill development India among youth for sustainable goals'

The resource person was Dr. Sunil Kr Saikia, Director, Centre of management studies, Guwahati Commerce College.

After lunch break the session started from 2:30 PM having an interaction with local entrepreneurs, Bimal Sarma(Owner of milk parlour), Binita Goswami (Fashion Designer) & Ranjit Kalita (Organic Farmer)

Day 2: The activity programme was divided in four sessions. The first session was on the topic 'Perspective of SDG 9:- Industry Innovation and Infrastructure' roled by Prof. Sashindra Kr Kakoty, Dept of Mechanical Engineering, IITG and second session was highlighted by Prof. Prasanta Sarma, Dept of commerce, Gauhati University, on the topic 'Concept of project for Entrpreneurial zeal'

Following a tea break Mr. Pranab Kr. Sarma, Former Head, Centre for Entrepreneurship Education and Faculty, IIE, Guwahati, explained the topic 'Need of generating entrepreneurial mindset among the youth for generating employment in NE' in two sessions with some physical activities. In this way the day-2 programme ended at around 4.00PM.

Day 3: The last day of the Conclave Mr. ASS Dewan, SR Faculty, IIE, Guwahati delivered a valuable talk on 'Entrepreneurship Development in Traditional Livelihood Skills of NE India'in the first session followed by A product promoting poster making competition hosted by Prof. Parag Barman on the topic of 'Vocal for local' in the next session.

Honourable guests for the valedictory session Prof. Laishram Ladu Singh, Honourable VC of Bodoland University, Prof. Birinchi Kr Das, Honorable VC of Bhattadev University were welcomed by Dr. Jitumani Rajbongshi and Prof. Vasanthi Rajendran, Training Division, RGNIYD, Govt of India attended the function through online mode.

The special guest **Prof. Laishram Ladu Singh,** Vice Chancellor of Bodo land University, delivered a lecture on Policies and programs for welfare of youth(with reference to NEP 2020 and NYP 2020), youth participation and mobilization of youthfor community development. In his session he clarified the concepts of Youth Development and Empowerment and their importance, highlighted the provisions of National Youth Policy and Skill Development Programs in India, salient features of the new National Education Policy 2020.

**Prof. Vasanthi Rajendran**, Head, Centre for Training and Orientation, RGNIYD, Sriperumbudur, Tamil Nadu during the tenth session spoke on the role of youth in nation building during the valedictory session. She also spoke on the conceptual framework of Youth and Nation Building, the importance of Youth for Nation Building, Contribution of Youth in India by citing case studies of Youth in Nation Building.

The conclave ended with distribution of certificates among the participants and a humble vote of thanks by Mr. Parag Barman, member, Organising Committee, RGNIYD Youth Conclave, 2020.

#### **Feedback of the Participants**

Among the participants, a total of 70 participants of the North-Eastern Region provided feedback.

### **Gender of the Respondents**

Among the students who provided feedback, 52% of them were male and the rest 48% were female.

#### Age of the Feedback Respondents

With regard to the age of the respondents, it was found that 73% of them were 20-21 years, while the rest 27% were in the age group of 22-23 years

#### **Education of the Respondents**

Among the respondents who provided feedback, 73% of them were Undergraduates and 27% were Postgraduates.

#### **Name of the State Presently Posted**

All the participants were from Assam particularly from Bajali and its nearby areas.

#### Specific issues to be addressed in future training programmes of RGNIYD

The students were further probed to provide the details of specific the issues that need to be kept in mind by RGNIYD while conducting the future programs. They delineated the following concerns:

- Programs aimed at developing the personality of youth
- Programs on Career Guidance and Counselling to guide the student youth
- Conduct programs on various career options for north-eastern youth
- Devote more time for interaction with the resource persons to clarify various issues on the subject
- More online programs may be conducted in view of the COVID-19 pandemic which will be easy and convenient to attend from their own educational institutions rather than coming to a particular training venue.

#### Challenges commonly faced while dealing with student youth

The Resource persons of the program were requested to list the challenges that they face while they deal with the student youth. Following are the challenges faced specifically while they closely interact and deal with the issues of youth:

- Lack of awareness on the problems and concerns of children (child psychology) and youth
- Lack of confidence to deal with the youth
- Communication gaps
- Problems in guiding the youth for right kind of employment
- Youth do not conform to discipline
- Lack of skills to deal with the poverty issues of students
- To help student youth to come out of their confusion state
- Gaining attention of the youth (due to various personal distractions)
- Enabling the youth to develop focus in life
- Assisting the youth to keep away from peer pressures
- Guiding the youth to keep away/productive use of social media

## Common challenges faced by the Students ineducational institutions/various northeastern states

Following were the responses that emerged during this interrogation:

- Problems of internet connectivity in rural areas
- Lack of seriousness about life among the youth
- Languageandcommunicationproblem(studentsfromotherstatesdonotattendclassre gularly)
- Access to sports facilities
- Lack of guidance for pursuing higher education
- Job crises
- Lack of technical skills among youth –need to enhance employability skills during the course of study

## A reas of attention for policy makers for development of children and you thin North Eastern Region

- Need to create more facility for poor people (access to education, jobs etc)
- Quality of education to been enhanced
- Necessity to form avenues for developing the personal skills and potentials of students
- Enhance chances for interactions / exposure of north east students to other parts of the country
- Development of mind-set of north east people to think that people of whole India have right to go anywhere in NE and vice versa
