## Webinar on Issues and Challenges of Youth

Date: 3 - 4 March 2022

The Centre for Tribal & North-eastern Youth Development (CTNEYD), Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD), Sriperumbudur in collaboration with the Department of Sociology, RGNIYD and the National Service Scheme (NSS) Regional Directorate, Guwahati, Assam organized a two day webinar on *Issues and Challenges of Youth of the Northeast* during 3 - 4 March 2022. The target participants for the webinar were the youth and youth functionaries, namely the NSS Programme Officers, NSS volunteers, students, teachers, youth representatives, etc.

#### The objectives of the webinar were:


- To deliberate on the problems and challenges faced by youth of the Northeastern region.
- To create awareness among young people and other stakeholders towards positive youth development.
- To familiarize the youth on the importance of meaningful engagement and the opportunities available for their development.

## Day One: 3 March 2022

The programme was inaugurated by Prof. (Dr.) Sibnath Deb, Director, RGNIYD. In his inaugural address, Prof. Deb deliberated on the many potentialities as well as the challenges faced by the youth of the North-eastern region (NER), and to recognize the rich diversity within the NER. He also flagged the requirement of mental health professionals to cater to the growing problems faced by youth today and the need to address the gap in the shortage of mental health professionals and counselors in the country to be able to cater to the increasing need of mental health issues of both students and teachers. Prof. Deb further touched upon the problems of drug abuse and HIV/AIDS in the region. He concluded his speech by encouraging the participants to look into the strengths and potentials of the region and underlined the need to have a positive attitude among young people.




The inaugural session was followed by the first session which was delivered by Ms. Nuneseno Chase, Director, Youth-Net, Kohima, Nagaland who highlighted the various youth oriented programmes and initiatives taken up by Youth Net. She emphasized a three pronged approach towards youth development adopted by Youth Net, viz, employment, skill training and entrepreneurship for youth development which was contextualized taking into consideration the unemployment scenario in Nagaland, and also to promote an entrepreneurial culture rather than a dependent culture of a government job. She elaborated that it was a need based approach after analysing the gap of employability skills among educated youth and graduates, and the programmes were envisaged to address the lack of entrepreneurial attitude among youth. The unique initiative of Youth Net such as the establishment of a Job Centre which is a first in the state of Nagaland, an incubation centre, government and industry partnerships, etc to cater to various challenges faced by the youth were also briefed.




The session was followed by Dr. (Fr.) P. D. Johny's (Rector & Director, DBI, Guwahati) deliberation on the many issues and challenges faced by the youth of the North Eastern Region (NER). He began by giving an overview of the demographic strength of youth in the NER and how it is important to tap their potential. Some of the issues highlighted by Dr. Johny are: problem of unemployment; social dimension -the youth are thrown into a world of uncertainty, insecurity, helplessness, causing disappointment, frustration and heightened emotionality; education -many young people continue their studies without an ambition, goal or vision, educated youth leave the villages to go to towns leaving the villages undeveloped, not interested to pursue farming or employ improved farming techniques; lack of guidance and direction from family and society; sports, games, leisure; social media addiction; substance abuse and other evils; lack of leadership; personality issues; situation of violence; values - young people tend to be drawn towards values of success, glamour, fashion, fame, pleasure, money, etc, and get carried away. He urged the youth to be focused in their approach towards life and not to be misled by things on social media, television, etc.







### Day Two: 4 March 2022

The second day of the webinar started with a panel discussion on the theme *Issues and Challenges of Youth of the Northeast*. The panellists were Prof. Polly Vauquiline, Head, Dept. of Women's Studies, Guwahati University, Shri. Dipak Kumar, Regional Director, Regional Directorate, NSS, Guwahati and Shri. F. Rumnong, State Nodal Officer (SNO), NSS, Meghalaya. Panellist Prof. Polly Vauquiline flagged a number of issues and concerns related to gender discrimination, and gave an over view of India's rank concerning the Gender Development Index (GDI) and Gender Inequality Index (GII). She underscored the need to educate young minds from an early age to promote gender equality and especially to start from our schools and colleges. She stressed that unless we are conscious of our privileged position, the invisibility and the poor plight of women and girls will continue which should be given a serious thought. She also emphasized the role of NSS functionaries to integrate gender concerns in their programmes.






Shri. Dipak Kumar encouraged the youth to have a dream and stressed upon the need for young people to look ahead into the future; the need to self-assess one's potentialities and weaknesses; and be flexible and be ready to change for better. He highlighted the many challenges faced by the youth of the northeastern region such as geographical isolation, high inter-state migration of youth for education and employment, higher dropout rates in higher education, lack of skill based education, lack of skill centres for skill development on local resources. He also informed the various opportunities the youth can look for given the advantage of low population density, high sex ratio, high literacy rate, rich heritage and culture, good physique, recent trend towards sports, and the rich base of natural resources like tea & crude oil, rich forest cover of timber, bamboo, cane, etc. He further added that there are good opportunities in horticulture, floriculture, agriculture, pisciculture and in other subsidiaries besides the tremendous scope for hydroelectric and a growing business opportunity on account of look east policy, etc.



Shri. Rumnong gave a detailed presentation on the various problems faced by youth especially in the context of Meghalaya. He deliberated on the problems from a policy perspective and while he commended the comprehensive youth policy initiatives, he underlined that any policy measure should translate on the ground through effective implementation and monitoring to ensure that it reaches the right target group. Additionally he pointed out that any policy or programme should be contextualized as per the local conditions and problems.





The programme was well received and participants representing NSS Programme Officers, NSS volunteers and students from the eight North-eastern states, viz, Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland, Sikkim and Tripura, and other faculty members and students from various institutions participated in the programme.


