The first day of the workshop started at 9:00 a.m. (IST) on 11<sup>th</sup> May 2022 with the Inaugural ceremony.


### **Inaugural Session**

The workshop began with the introduction given by Dr. Rambabu Botcha, the coordinator of the Workshop at 9:00 a.m. on 11th May 2022. Dr. Rambabu Botcha explained the significance of structural Social Work practice in the Indian context with which we can ensure justice and equality in the society towards the betterment of the weaker sections. Dr. Botcha thanked and appreciated Dr Baiju P V, MacEwan University, Canada and other resource team members from Canada and India for their acceptance to deliver the session in the workshop.




After that, Dr. S. Lalitha, Head, Department of Social Work delivered the welcome address on the occasion. She welcomed all the resource team members from Canada and India, the Director of RGNIYD, faculty members of the Department, faculty members and Heads of other Departments in RGNIYD and participants of the workshop including the students of the Department of the Social Work at RGNIYD. She highlighted in her

welcome address that structural social work is to be adopted in the Indian context for delivering the services systematically and effectively for the benefit of the marginalised and disadvantaged sections in the society. She appreciated the coordinator of the workshop Dr. Rambabu Botcha for the active engagement in organising this kind of academic deliberations.



The two-day international workshop was inaugurated by Prof. Dr. Sibnath Deb, Director, Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development on 11th May 2022.



In his inaugural address, he highlighted the need and importance of social work practice in the Indian context for the betterment of various sessions in the society.



Prof. Deb appreciated Dr Rambabu Botcha and the Department of Social Work at Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development and its faculty for organising a series of academic discourses for the benefit of the Social Work fraternity and thereby contributing for the National Building. He suggested all the participants take an active part in the two-day workshop and provide valuable feedback on the programme.

PhD, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, Central University of Tami Nadu, Thiruvarur Tamil Nadu, and Prof. Pradeep Jare Assistant Professor, Centre for Studies in Rural Development Institute of Social Work and Research Ahmednagar, Maharashtra for their acceptance and deliberations in the workshop.

Filipe Duarte, Assistant Professor, School of Social Work, University of Windsor, ON, Canada, Dr Chitra KP, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, Central University of Tami Nadu, Thiruvarur Tamil Nadu, Mr. Pradeep Jare, Assistant Professor, Centre for Studies in Rural Development Institute of Social Work and Research Ahmednagar, Maharashtra, India, Head of the Department of social work and other faculty members including the coordinator of the workshop Dr Rambabu. Botcha. Ms. Lakshmi Priya, Department of Social Work, RGNIYD who anchored the inaugural session of the Workshop.

#### Session - 1

After completion of the inaugural session of the workshop, the first session was started by Professor Filipe Duarte, PhD on 'Understanding the Theory and Practice of Structural Social Work from a Global Perspective. He delivered his session on various important aspects related to the historical roots of structural approaches in social work practice. A set of evidence-based structural social practices from Canada and also the relevance of structural social work in the current context and emerging scenario were presented by Dr Filipe. A set of questions were raised by the participants of the workshop and the resource person had given suitable clarification on the queries.



As part of the session, there were more than half a dozen questions about the topic asked by the participants. The questions include the mechanism to train the students of social work in structural approaches during their studies; how far the inputs are provided in structural social work practice in the Indian context; is there any need of including the structural concepts in the Social Work syllabus and issues that can be dealt through structural social work in the Canadian context. Dr Filipe and other resource team members had given suitable inputs to the participants stating that there is a need of inculcating the mind-set among the students, and educators to teach and practice structural approaches in social work education; also there is a need to incorporate structural aspects into the syllabus of BSW and MSW program.

#### Session - 2

The second session of the workshop was conducted by Mr Pradeep Jare, Assistant Professor, Centre for Studies in Rural Development Institute of Social Work and Research Ahmednagar, Maharashtra.



He spoke about the roots of structural social work in India by connecting with various movements by renowned social activists, and professional social workers during the last nine decades. He also explained various challenges and problems in conventional Social Work practices. He connected the participants of the workshop to various aspects of an emerging scenario and contemporary developments and he also highlighted the relevance of structural approaches for a better understanding of various issues in the society and robust solutions for the betterment of the society. At the end of the second session, the participants of the workshop asked a set of questions include why Indian Social Work educators and practitioners are not able to derive best practices from other parts of the world?, what can be the role of the development sector in promoting structural social work practices in the Indian context?. Mr Pradeep Jare and the resource team of the workshop responded to the above-mentioned questions and suggested that many social work educators are updating themselves with the emerging approaches in social work practice, but there is a need of connecting oneself to the recent developments in the society and adopt the same for the betterment of the society.

#### DAY - 2, 12 MAY, 2022, Session - 3

The second day of the workshop started with a set of announcements by the workshop coordinator Dr. Rambabu Botcha. The third session of the workshop was delivered by Dr. Chitra K.P. PhD on "Environmental social Work in India: Perspective Building for Social Work Education and Practice".




She gave an overview of green social work in India by highlighting a set of references in the Indian context. She also presented climate-induced disasters and their impact according to the CSE 2021 report and also Asia Pacific Disaster Report 2019. In her presentation, she highlighted inequality through deprivation, lacking food, employment, healthcare, and education, and inequalities of income and opportunity. At the same time, she also highlighted the dispossession, displacement, internal migration, outmigration, and the risk from disasters – death, and Injury as part of her session on ecological social work.

There were more than half a dozen questions for the speaker, related to the role of Development Organisations in promoting green social work and its relevance to structural social work practice, the need of revamping of social work curriculum with a green social work syllabus etc. She clarified all the questions raised by the participants.

#### Session - 4

The fourth and final session of the workshop was delivered by Dr Baiju P Vareed, where he used a case study method to explain, how structural social work can be used in various problem situations.




Dr Baiju P Vareed provided an overview of five case studies to the participants. During the activity as part of the case study analysis by the different groups, Dr Baiju tried to bring the structural issues pertaining to each case study and explained the actions to be initiated in each context. In that process, he also discussed the practical difficulties in the Indian context based on the cast, class, political influence etc. Some of the participants also complimented with the inputs provided by the resource team.

The activity was very much appreciated by the participants. In fact, the session was conducted by distributing the participants into 10 groups through breakout rooms on the Google meet platform. There was a fruitful discussion that took place on the five case studies and structural issues in the Indian Context. The participants of the workshop group-wise shared their observations on each case study which resulted in a positive outcome during the workshop. A set of questions were asked by the participants. Dr Baiju clarified all the questions during the discussion at the end of the session.

### **The Valedictory Session**

The valedictory session of the workshop started with the welcome address delivered by Dr S. Lalitha, Head of the Department of Social Work at Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development (RGNIYD).



She welcomed all the resource team members from India and Canada, authorities of RGNIYD, Heads of various Departments at RGNIYD, the faculty members of the Department of Social Work and the beloved participants of the workshop.

In her welcome address, she appreciated the resource team and the participants of the workshop for their active contribution and energetic participation throughout the two-day workshop. She thanked Dr Rambabu Botcha, the coordinator of the workshop for his efforts and hard work in making the workshop successful. She also said that this kind of academic discourse should be taken up more for the benefit of the Social Work fraternity across the country and with this workshop; Dr Botcha brought laurel to the department.

After the welcome address given by Dr S Lalita, Dr Rambabu Botcha, the coordinator of the workshop presented a brief report to the participants of the workshop. He highlighted the glimpse of the two-day workshop beginning with the inaugural session in which the inaugural address was given by Prof. Sibnath Deb, Director, RGNIYD.


After the Inaugural session, the first session on Understanding the Theory and Practice of Structural Social Work: A Global Perspective was delivered by Dr Filipe Duarte, the second session on Understanding Structural Social Work in the Indian Context by Mr. Pradeep Jare,



The third session on Developing Practice framework for Structural Social Work in the Indian context with Ecological Perspective by Dr. Chitra KP and the last session on Practising Structural Social Work in the Indian context by Dr P. V Baiju were conducted. He also presented the list of resource teams involved in the workshop and the number of participants who attended the workshop from various states of the country and also the contributions and effort of the organising team from the Department of Social Work.

The two day International Workshop on "Structural Approaches in Social Work Education and Practice" was very fruitful for the participants. All the participants on both days took an active part and energetically engaged themselves while learning from the expert team and contributing to the content presented by the experts.

It was a new experience for many participants of the workshop as the discussions and deliberations on structural social work are not much evident in India. Therefore the participants had involved with a lot of enthusiasm and energy during the 2 day workshop.







# Feedback from the Participants on International Workshop on Structural Approaches in Social Work Education and Practice


There were 174 participants (educators, practitioners, students, research scholars and functionaries of various departments and organisations) who gave feedback on the overall conduct of the two day International Workshop on Structural Approaches in Social Work Education and Practice held from 11-12 May 2022. The same has been provided hereunder. The feedback was collected by administering Google Forms.



As far as the category of the participants is concerned, the majority (43%) of the workshop participants belong to the student community from various institutions of social work in India. Around 22% of them were research scholars at the same time nearly 24% of the participants were from the social work educators' community. It was found that nearly half of the participants were students of social work.




There was representation from 24 states in the workshop. Around 16% of them were from Kerala. 15.5% of them were from Maharashtra and 14.4 per cent of the participants are from Kerala State. Around 11 percent of the participants took part in the Workshop from Tamil Nadu and nearly 10 percent of the participants were from Andhra Pradesh.




The Workshop was organised on the theme related to Structural Approaches in Social Work Practice and Education. The organising team wanted to invite the young population of the country, particularly social work students. It was found from the feedback received from the participants that 60% of the total participants belonged to the youth category that comes under the age bracket of 15 to 29 years.


The organising committee of the workshop has attained its objective to provide knowledge on emerging issues and contemporary trends related to social work and youth participation in structural social work practice to targeted participants.




The first session delivered by Prof. Fillipe Duarte on Understanding Theory and Practice of Structural Social Work: Global Perspective was rated as an excellent one by 64% of the participants and nearly 32% of the participants rated it as a good session.




The second session delivered by Mr. Pradeep Jare on Understanding Theory and Practice of Structural Social Work in Indian Context was rated as an excellent one by 59% of the participants and nearly 37% of the participants rated it as a good session.




The third session delivered by Dr.Chitra.K.P on Developing Practice Framework for Structural Social Work in Indian Context was rated as an excellent one by 65.5% of the participants and nearly 30.5% of the participants rated it as a good session.




The fourth session delivered by Prof. Baiju P Vareed on Practicing Structural Social Work in Indian Context was rated as an excellent one by 64.4% of the participant and 31% of the participants rated it as a good session.




More than 69 percent of the participants rated the technical support received from the RGNIYD as excellent and around 30 per cent of them rated it as good. It was found that about 99% of the workshop participants were very happy and very much satisfied with the overall technical support rendered by the technical team at RGNIYD during the International Workshop on Structural Approaches in Social Work Education and Practice.




The overall coordination of the workshop was rated by the participants. Around 64 per cent of the participants rated it as an excellent one. Nearly 32 per cent of the participants rated it as a very good one. The remaining per cent of the participants rated themselves as fair and poor. Nearly 97 % of the total participants were very much happy with the overall coordination of the workshop.



About 97 per cent of the participants expressed that this kind of workshop should happen periodically on Professional Social Work and Various Approaches. This finding is something interesting and indicates that the participants are interested to take part in academic discourses like conferences, seminars, and workshops regularly and contribute to making it a successful one.



Nearly 40 per cent of the participants expressed their opinion that they are interested in participating in the workshop through online mode. Nearly 37 per cent of the participants expressed their opinion that they are interested in participating in workshops through offline mode. 23.6 per cent of the participants expressed their opinion that they are interested in participating in workshop through online mode. It was found that after Covid-19, the conference, seminars and workshops should be organised through blended mode so that all interested people can attend and benefitted from the same.



More than 67 percent of the participants rated the communication received from the organizing team as excellent and around 30 per cent of them rated as good. It was found that about 90% of the workshop participants were happy and satisfied with the communication sent by the organising committee to the participants.

The positive feedback on the two-day workshop on Structural Approaches in Social Work Education and Practice in India motivated and encouraged the faculty and students at the Department of Social Work at RGNIYD to initiate and conduct more such programs in the near future. The positive academic atmosphere in the institute facilitated the faculty members to organise such programs in a systematic manner. It was also found that all the stakeholders including the RGNIYD authorities, technical team, resource team, faculty members, participants, and students and supporting team came together in organising the workshop in an effective way.

#### **Background of the Programme**

Structural social work is one of the social work practice methods, among progressive and radical social work approaches developed in the end of last century. Structural social work suggests that social problems are not caused by deficits in communication between individuals, but people suffer from social, economic, and psychological problems of institutional structures. It is not the individual's failure to adjust to the systems, but the oppressive structures in the society keep many people powerless, and unable to access resources for dignified life.

Structural social work in Indian context requires special attention as many of the struggles Indian society go through are the direct results of social, economic, legal, religious, class and caste structures. Though they vary between states and within states and communities, the larger structural arches are the same. George (2005) argues that, despite the criticism of structural social work as idealistic theory, field experiences from social work agencies in India demonstrate that structural social work be practice but is also necessary for transformational change. (Vareed, et al, 2022). This workshop hopes to share theoretical understanding and practice framework for such progressive change for social workers.

### **Objectives**
